Lead singer and songwriter Adam Duritz writes about a world filled

with forlorn lovers, characters who feel certain they're on the edge of despair or commitment or something. And songs such as "Mr. Jones" and "Raining in Baltimore"

are as infectious as they are astute. With a debut this vital, Counting Crows are certain to either be around for a very long time, or immediately self-destruct. Nothing in-between will do.
