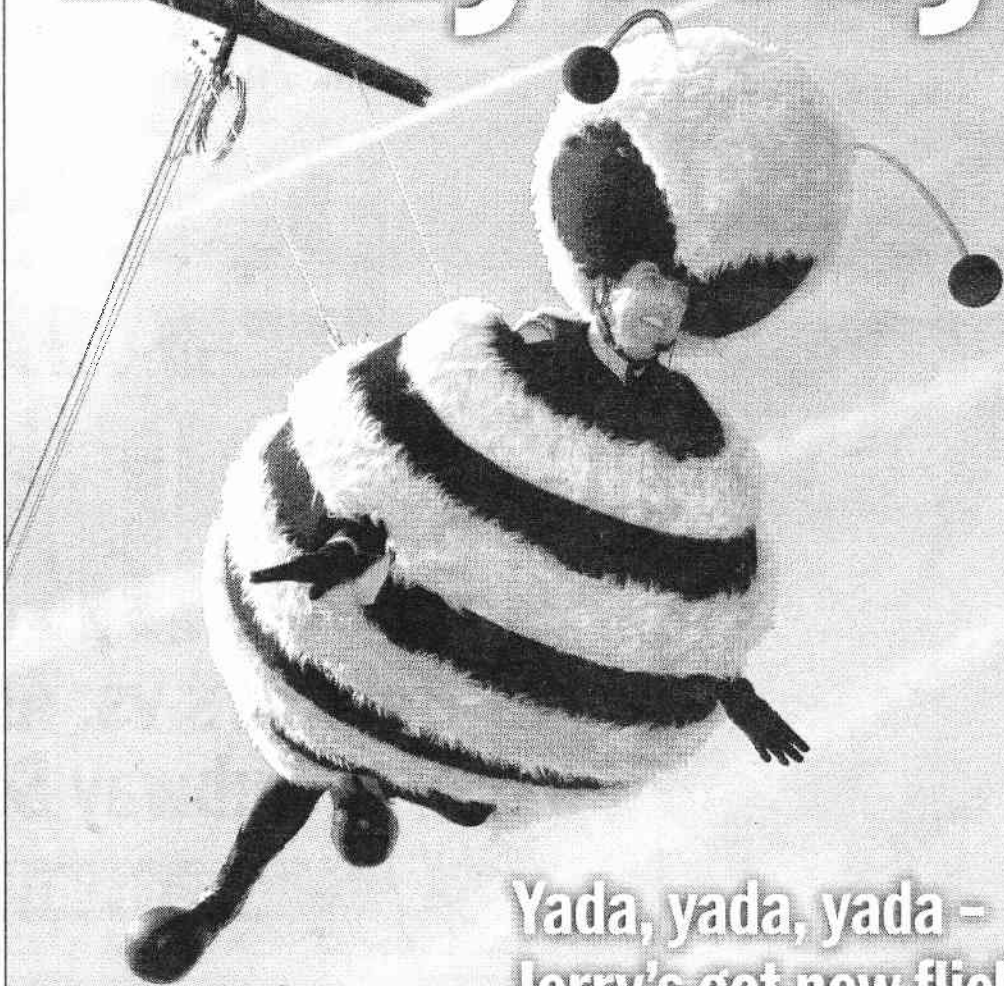

YESTERDAY, COMEDIAN JERRY Seinfeld donned a giant bee costume, stood on the roof of the Carlton Hotel in Cannes, and jumped onto the beach. Not that there's anything wrong with that: The Master of Nothing was there to show footage from "Bee Movie," due in November from DreamWorks.

It's his first major project since "Seinfeld" went off the air in 1998. Mini one-minute "Bee Movie" behind-the-scenes comedy bits will air on NBC this fall.

Seinfeld created, wrote and produced the animated comedy about a bee (Seinfeld) who hates having only one job his entire life. He breaks the cardinal rule of talking to a human (Renee Zellweger) and discovers humans have been ripping off all their honey for years. Like any good New Yorker (his hive is located in Central Park), he decides to sue.

The first question at a press conference that followed came from a French journalist, who tried to out-funny the sitcom and standup legend: "To be or not to be — that is the question of 'Bee Movie.'"

After a moment of deafening silence, Seinfeld replied, "That's a joke we also tried, to about the same reaction you just got."
