A touch too soft

ovels about the theater are usually written with poison pens. They brim with malice or at least delicious glee in satirizing a tiny, insular world that's melodramatic and over-the-top. But in Christopher Bram's too-gentle new novel, frustrated playwrights, cutting critics, and self-absorbed actors inspire only empathy and good-natured ribbing from the author of Father of Frankenstein—the novel on gay director James Whale that became the Oscar-winning film Gods and Monsters.

Caleb Doyle is a miserable writer whose new play has bombed; he unwittingly shares a therapist with Kenneth Prager, the second-string critic for *The New York Times* who ripped his play to shreds but likes the new musical *Tom & Gerry* (a spin on the Preston Sturges classic *The*

Palm Beach Story), which stars out British actor Henry Lewse, who is smitten with Doyle's recently dumped boyfriend, Toby, and has Doyle's sister, Jessie, for an assistant.

None of this is terribly madcap or piercing, BRAIN STATES ANIMALS

and at the predictable finale—a birthday party for Doyle— Bram follows too closely the edict that if a gun is introduced in the first act, it must go off in the third.
