THIS FOUR-DISC BOXED SET of Tom Hanks' Emmy-winning miniseries is easily the most lavish and desirable DVD package yet. (The fact that it's not yet available on cassette-except through Columbia House-makes it that much more special.) Housed in a compact silver slipease, the 12-part miniseries, like the space program

itself, is both wildly ambitious and a straightforward, nutsand-bolts endeavor. Each episode tracks the space race from a different angle; the scientists and academics behind the scenes, the social upheaval of the era, and, of course, the various missions. The series can and should be watched as a

whole, but each segment stands on its own. One segment stars Dave Foley as an aw-shucks astronaut just happy to be along for the ride; another, directed by Sally Field, details the pressure on astronauts' wives.
