SUNDAY, JAN. 27

📺 **"The 14th Annual Screen Actors Guild Awards"** The one awards show that will actually have star power. Look for Denzel Washington, Emile Hirsch, Zac Efron, Kate Hudson and others to present or appear at the show and look glamorous. Charles Durning will be given a Lifetime Achievement Award, and Burt Reynolds will help present it. (TNT and TBS, 8 p.m.)

📺 **"The Wire"** Seriously, how many more articles and reviews have to be written before you finally give this great drama set in Baltimore a shot? (HBO, 9 p.m.)

MONDAY, JAN. 28

📺 **"State of the Union Address"** President Bush either takes the opportunity to tell Americans what they already know about a tough economy or insists all is well. In any case, it makes for gripping drama: Will he try to pronounce the name of the Iranian president? Can he correctly pronounce "nuclear"? (All major channels, 9 p.m.)

📺 **"Kyle XY"** Kyle's attempts to forge a real relationship with Amanda flounder worse than ever. Maybe it's the mysterious organization trying to kill him and everyone around him. Maybe it's that GLAAD Media Award the show just won giving her pause. Or maybe it's his lack of a bellybutton. That can be awkward.

TUESDAY, JAN. 29

📺 **"House"** One of the few fall shows that still can boast an original episode or two, House confronts a paralyzed woman (Janel Moloney) who may not be telling the whole truth about her illness.

📺 **"Baghdad Hospital: Inside the Red Zone"** You thought the surgeons on "M*A*S*H" had it rough. This

documentary nervously shows us the conditions at the most dangerous hospital in the world, Al-Yarmouk in Baghdad. And there's not a laugh in it. (HBO, 8:30 p.m.)

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 30

📺 **"One Tree Hill"** Lucas (Chad Michael Murray) spends an episode flashing back to what he has done in the past four years — filling in viewers on what happened after the

end of last season, when this prime-time soap decided to leap four years into the future and send story lines into hyperdrive. (CW, 9 p.m.)

📺 **"National Geographic: Eden at the End Of the World"**

Global warming hasn't quite yet destroyed everything of beauty, as this special showing us the wonders of Patagonia — found amid Chile and Argentina — makes spectacularly clear. (PBS, 8 p.m.)

THURSDAY, JAN. 31

📺 **"Soundstage"** Simon Cowell, Randy Jackson and Paula Abdul all picked Chris Daughtry as the most surprising post-"Idol" success. It's no surprise, really. They never got a chance to find out that Daughtry could write catchy rock songs. Here, he and his band perform live. (PBS, 12:30 a.m.)

📺 **"31 Days Of Oscar"** The only decent cable channel still showing classic movies uncut, letter-boxed when appropriate and without commercials, TCM gives cineastes an orgy of pleasure next month, when it begins its month-long celebration of Oscar by showing only movies nominated for or winners of Academy Awards. (TCM, 8 p.m.)

FRIDAY, FEB. 1

📺 **"Friday Night Lights"** Another rare fall show with a few new episodes left in the hamper, maybe this could be the break "FNL" needs for the struggling but acclaimed drama to get sampled by a wider audience. (NBC, 9 p.m.)

📺 **"Late Show With David Letterman"**

Dave chats with Paris Hilton after her frenzied visit to Sundance, where Robert Redford poo-pooed her as having nothing to do with anything — yet, oddly, photographers couldn't get enough of the heiress, business gal and former jailbird. (CBS, 11:30 p.m.)

SATURDAY, FEB. 2

📺 **"Bridal Fever"** The Hallmark Channel knows its women: It has got Delta Burke, who has designs on a wedding in this new TV movie, which co-stars Andrea Roth. (Hallmark, 9 p.m.)



📺 **"iCarly"** A TV producer wants to bring Carly's Web show to television — but of course he wants to change everything about it in the process. And Carly is not an iSellout. (Nickelodeon, 8 p.m.)
