The 40-Year-Old Virgin ★★★¹/2 Universal; \$29.98

The dirty little secret about "outrageous" comedies like "Harold & Kumar Go to White Castle," "Road Trip" and "40-Year-Old Virgin" is that — at heart — they're very sweet. This Steve Carell charmer (with Catherine Keener winning as his true love) is no exception. Avoid the unrated edition, which pads the film with an extra 17 minutes. Comedies should be short and sweet.

Airplane: The "Don't Call Me Shirley" Edition ★★★★

Paramount; \$19.99

If one joke a minute is funny, then surely five jokes a minute (however lame they may be) is even funnier. Yes, that's true, but don't call this movie Shirley. A dumb and dumber — and funny and funnier — spoof of airplane disaster movies that holds up surprisingly well. Loads of deleted scenes and funny commentary.

Roll Bounce ★★★ Fox; \$27.98

In 1977, Bow Wow and his buddies are heartbroken when the local roller-skating rink shuts down. They head crosstown to the flashier rink where a "skate-off" against an older, savvier team is as

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inevitable as the soundtrack of funky songs like Chic's "Le Freak." Young love, stern parents and an earful of Bee Gees and Donna Summer tunes make this a nice surprise.
