Remington Steele: Season Two

PIERCE Brosnan was born to play James Bond. And he proved it via this witty drama about a debonair con man who teams up with a private detective (Stephanie Zimbalist) to solve crimes. This season brings Doris ("Everybody Loves Raymond") Roberts as their computer-savvy assistant, not to mention fanfavorite episode "Red Hot Steele." Genial fun.

Lady Sings the Blues

(Paramount, \$14.99)

AS Diana Ross explains in a new 23-minute documentary, she'd just left the Supremes and was worried about her future when Motown head Berry Gordy created this 1972 vehicle for Ross to tell the story of troubled blues legend Billie Holiday. Billy Dee Williams and Richard Pryor are good, but the real surprise is Ross. She's so magnetic that you can't believe this melodrama didn't lead to a real movie career.
