

But in the golden era of Hollywood, big, lumbering epics like 1959's 11-time Oscar winner "Ben-Hur Collector's Edition" managed to remain intelligent and engaging - thanks to director William Wyler and the stolid Charlton Heston. Extras are beyond lavish, not least of which is the complete 1925 silent version, two substantial documentaries and much more. Also out: the near-miss of 1983's "Rumble Fish Special Edition" (Universal; \$19.98) and the triumphant 1980 Loretta Lynn bio-pic "Coal Miner's Daughter 25th Anniversary Edition" (Universal; \$19.98).

This new boxed set collects the work of four groundbreaking music video directors, each of which is available for \$24.98. It makes clear these short films aren't just launching pads for young talent or promos for rock stars, but fascinating, brilliant works of art. Artists featured with roughly a dozen works each include Anton Corbijn (U2's "One"), Mark Romanek (Johnny Cash's "Hurt"), Jonathan Glazer (Radiohead's "Karma Police") and Stephane Sednaoui (Bjork's "Big Time Sensuality").
