THESE brief documentary shorts from the early 1900s are exceedingly ordinary: factory workers leaving work, schoolchildren walking, a temperance march and other scenes of daily life. But they offer a glimpse of life more than 100 years ago, helped tremendously by a supple score. Solid extra: A historian who puts these early filmmakers into context.
