The groundbreaking script by Dennis Potter ("The Singing Detective") lets characters break out into song by lipsyncing to period tunes and then cruelly yanks them back to reality. Steve Martin starred in a remarkably faithful adaptation for the movies only three years later (Warner Bros., \$19.97) that freaked out fans of "The Jerk."

Use of genuine war footage isn't just a moneysaver; it's a sober reminder that real people made these sacrifices. Along with 16 episodes, extras include a new documentary and audio

French director Claude Chabrol has gained in stature over the years. But, in truth, he's not "the French Hitchcock." He's just secondrate Hitchcock. This silly 1995 thriller is typically hard to swallow. Isabelle Huppert stars as a servant who seduces the illiterate Sophie (Sandrine Bonnaire) into turning on their employer.
