### Spider-Man 2 Special Edition

"THE Empire Strikes Back." "Superman II." "Tarzan and His Mate." Yes, "Spider-Man 2" joins these classics as another example of a sequel even better than the original. Tobey Maguire anchors this heartfelt, witty film about the hapless Peter Parker with a sensitive, convincing performance that deserves an Oscar nomination. Loads of extras, including a look at how they filmed the visually striking villain Doc Ock. 'Nuff said.

#### Hero

JET Li is the martial-arts hero fighting for the future of ancient China in this art-house version of an action film. Rather static, most of the story is told in flashbacks. While the fights are not always exciting, they are gorgeous. The fights are extraordinary to look at, making "Hero" one of the most beautiful films of the year.

## It's All True

DID Orson Welles sabotage his brilliant career with childish behavior and mercurial projects? Or did Hollywood sandbag the genius because he was too frighteningly talented and arrogant? This documentary looks at his first great boondoggle. A South American jaunt, it resulted in an unfinished film, the death of an amateur actor and the butchering of Welles' second feature, "The Magnificent Ambersons," when he left the editing to the studio to fly south of the border. Fascinating and frustrating, just like him.
