harles Busch has stared down a number of challenges in the last few years. He wrote his first novel (Whores of Lost Atlantis), made his cabaret debut, and tried and tried to write an animated musical (Pygmalion set in ancient Egypt) for Disney. "After I failed the first time," says Busch, "they said I was writing too juvenile; they wanted me to be

role? "I did a great deal of research on men," he deadpans. The real difficulty, says Busch, is toning down his own overthe-top mannerisms, the same ones that make playing females based on Stanwyck and Crawford so utterly natural. "It's very hard just being human because I tend to move like I'm in an old movie," says Busch. "I'm just very stylized." But aren't men's clothes, at least, more comfortable? "They're boring," he moans. "All the women in the show get to wear very, very chic high-fashion clothes. My next show I'm going to be wearing the most glamorous drag you ever saw.
